Ownership: I certify that the above mentioned dog is being adopted by me, solely as a pet for myself and/or my immediate family. I understand that the adoption of the above mentioned dog is a lifetime commitment and I will do everything within my power to care for the dog to ensure its optimum health, safety, and happiness. I agree not to give away, sell, or trade my dog to any person(s), dealer, retailer, auction, institute or any other entity for any reason. I will neither take the dog to a shelter nor abandon or otherwise dispose of the dog. I agree that if I am unable to care for the above mentioned dog for its entire lifetime at any point, I will contact Pawsitive Pathways Inc immediately.

Return Policy: Pawsitive Pathways Inc recognizes that some matches may not be successful. In these cases, we request you please contact us as soon as possible and we will discuss taking the dog back into our care. We would greatly prefer that the dog come back to us rather than you feeling forced to live in a situation that is not suitable for you or the above mentioned dog. This quick guide was created to help you connect with your new companion and maintain a healthy, loving, and fun relationship throughout life.

With equal amounts of patience, consistency, leadership and love, you and your dog are destined to have a fantastic future together!

Please feel free to contact us or a local trusted dog trainer or veterinarian of your choice if you have any questions!



- Allow your dog to settle in and become familiar with their new family & surroundings for the first TWO WEEKS at least, before going out on trips or meeting new people/animals.
- It's important to be a good role model in order to bond and gain trust with your dog. Your dog must be able to look to you for guidance at all times and see that you will be a kind, calm and confident guardian.
- Just like humans, dogs like to have their own personal space. It is important for your dog to have a crate to achieve this. We highly recommend feeding your dog in their crate and to sleep at night.

- Keeping your dog's body AND brain frequently engaged is key. Practicing simple training exercises or letting them solve food puzzles and have busy toys are easy ways to achieve this! Or join a local training class!
- Mental exercise and enrichment is actually MORE important than physical running, jumping, etc. When dogs get bored or don't have direction, they become destructive, depressed and have bad manners.
- Dogs are smart and they like to prove it. They need to have a job!
 Their job can be as simple as 'wait' at all doors before going through or to 'sit and wait' before getting a treat or a meal. Learning new tricks and commands is great too!
- Your new dog has worked hard to learn how to behave on a leash. They have been trained to walk calmly on a slip leash or regular collar and leash. We do NOT recommend basic harnesses or retractable leashes as these can actually trigger dogs to pull and can be unsafe! Other types of collars can be used if desired/needed, just ask us!
- When introducing your dog to new people, pets or places, keep it calm and positive. If your dog shows fear or stress, give them space and a distraction by stepping away and asking them to perform simple commands for a treat. Do not force or coddle them or be upset/nervous - they can easily sense and match your emotions!

3. KEEP YOUR COMPANION HEALTHY 🌞 🛶

Keep your pet's <u>vaccines and exams</u> up to date to ensure they stay their healthiest and live their longest! There are several dangerous and contagious diseases that dogs are at risk of, but they are preventable with vaccination and prevention medication. Just ask your vet!

4. CONTINUOUS ENRICHMENT AND TRAINING

Both physical and <u>mental exercise</u> is extremely important for dogs! When dogs get bored or have excess energy, they can become destructive, depressed and have bad manners. RABIES PREVENTION

What is Rabies?

Rabies is a deadly disease caused by a virus that attacks the nervous system. The virus is secreted in saliva and is usually transmitted to people and animals by a bite from an infected animal. Less commonly, rabies can be transmitted when saliva from a rabid animal comes in contact with an open cut on the skin or the eyes, nose, or mouth of a person or animal. Once the outward signs of the disease appear, rabies is nearly always fatal.

Why should I be concerned?

Rabies is increasing in wildlife throughout Colorado, placing both humans and animals at risk for this deadly disease. Skunks and bats are the most significant sources of rabies in Colorado. Dogs, cats, skunks, bats, raccoons, foxes, and coyotes can carry rabies. In Colorado other wild animals, dogs, cats, horses and livestock can become infected if they are bitten by a rabid animal. Contact with infected wild or domestic animals places you and your family at risk for rabies infection.

What are the signs of Rabies in animals?

Once the rabies virus enters the body, it travels along the nerves to the brain. Dogs, cats, and ferrets with rabies may show a variety of signs, including fearfulness, aggression, excessive drooling, difficulty swallowing, staggering, and seizures. Rabid wild animals may only display unusual behavior; for example, an animal that is usually only seen at night may be seen wandering in the daytime.

What can I do to help control and prevent exposure to Rabies?

- --Have your veterinarian vaccinate your dogs, cats and ferrets. Your veterinarian will advise you on the recommended frequency of vaccination in your area.
- --Don't leave exposed garbage or pet food outside, as it may attract wild or stray animals.
- --Wild animals should never be kept as pets. Not only may this be illegal, but wild animals pose a potential rabies threat to caretakers and to others.
- --Observe all wild animals from a distance. A rabid wild animal may appear tame but don't go near it. Teach children NEVER to handle unfamiliar animals, even if they appear friendly.
- --If you see a wild animal acting strangely, report it to the city or county animal control department.
- --Protect your home from wildlife by minimizing entry points to your home and nesting areas surrounding
- --Always supervise and maintain control of your pets when outdoors
